

SUBJECT: Interrogation of 2d Lt. Stratton M. Appleman

Commanding General, Eighth Service Command, Santa Fe Building, TO: Dallas 2, Texas ATTENTION: Director, Security and Intelligence Division

1. It is requested that Second Lieutenant Stratton M. Appleman, 0-673709, 1857 Service Command Unit, Reception Station, Fort Sam Houston, Texas, be interviewed and that his testimony regarding war crimes be taken under oath in question and answer form, as indicated in paragraphs 6, 7, and 8 of the letter dated 2 June 1945 from the Commanding General, Army Service Forces, on the subject of "Interviews with Repatriates from Enemy Territory re War Crimes".

- 2. The attention of Lieutenant Appleman should be directed particularly to the alleged execution of a number of American and British air force officers who were at Camp Buchenwald and who were removed therefrom on or about 19 October 1944. Extracts from a letter prepared by Walter S. Joy, Special Agent, CIC, and a forwarding letter from the Staff Judge Advocate, ETO, are inclosed to assist the examiner.
- 3. In view of the apparent importance of this matter, it is requested that the interrogation be expedited as much as possible.
- 4. If Lieutenant Appleman has left your area, this request should be forwarded to the headquarters of the service command in which he is located, directed to the attention of the Director, Security and Intelligence Division, and information regarding the reference should be communicated to this office.

- Q. State your name, mank, serial number, and present home address.
- A. Strutton M. Appleman, 2nd Lt., 0-673709, P. O. Box 267, Aransas Pass, Texas.
- Q. What were you engaged in prior to entering service?
- A. Student of Journalism at University of Texas.
- Q. When did you join the Army?
- A. 21 January 1942.
- Q. When did you first become a prisoner of the Germans?
- A. 6 June 1944.
- Q. What providions were made for quarters for the 160 American and British officers who were taken to Buchemmald on 20 August 1944.
- A. We were forced to sleep in the open on stone paved area, no shelter or blankets. It was in August but we were on a mountain and it was cold at night. This lasted for two weeks.
- Q. What kind of clothing did you have?
- A. When we first arrived all of our clothing was taken away from us. We were shaved from head to foot and then we were issued a shirt and a pair of pants each, which clothing was taken from Jewish prisoners who had been exterminated.
- Q. Was it known by the German authorities that you were prisoners of war?
- A. The German commandant of Buchensald remarked to Squadron Leader Lamason of the New Zealand Air Force that he knew we were prisoners of war, but there was nothing he could do about it at the time. This remark was made two days after we were taken to Buchenwald.
- Q. Were any protests made by your group?

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A protest was made by the Senior British Officer, Squadron Leader Lamason, Capt. Larson (FNU) Senior American Officer with the request that the protest transmitted to Berlin and request that we be moved to a regular prisoner of war camp. The protests were made at least three different times. Each time they were rejected and usually with the remark that we were Luftwaffe gangsters and were lucky to be treated as well as we were.

- Q. Do you know who the Commandant of Buchenwald was?
- A. No.
- Q. Do you know the name of any other responsible German officers at Buchenwald?
- A. No.
- Q. What food were you given at Buchemmald?
- A. A bowl of soup daily, 1/6 loaf of bread, and potatoes twice a week. We didn't receive any Red Cross parcels.
- Q. After the two week period without shelter, what kind of quarters were you given?
- A. We were given quarters which were formerly occupied by about 500 Gypsy children. These children were moved out and according to rumor were exterminated. These barracks were about the size of an ordinary barracks in a U. S. Army post, and had 4 tiers of bunks which were merely shelves about 5 feet wide and separated by a 4' x 4'. These shelves ran along the wallsthe full length of the barracks on both sides. There were no mattresses, but there were two blankets to every 4 men. There were 750 persons in this barracks, including our group. The others were not prisoners of war, but included people of all nationalities.
- Q. Were there any protests made about these quarters/
- A. Yes, we protested at being kept at this camp. We also requested that we be kept in separate barracks from the other people, so as to be allowed to set up our sanitation system and take precautions against disease. The requests were never granted, except that we were finally moved to a prisoner of war camp.
- Q. Do you know why the 120 men were taken to Buchenwald.
- A. Yes, because all of them were in civilian clothes when captured.
- Q. Did these men have anything to prove they were prisoners of war?
- A. Most of these men had dog tags.
